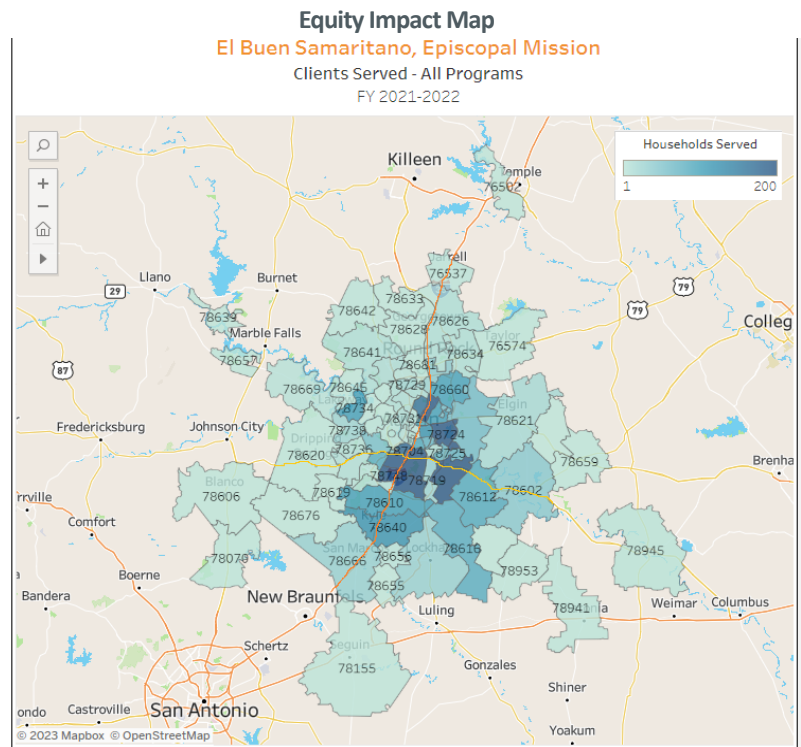

- Through partnerships, El Buen implements a coordinated effort to reach deeper into multiple and diverse communities of color.
- Our partners allow us to strategically establish deep connections with communities that are most negatively affected by the current economics and pandemic environment.

El Buen collaborates with partners to increase reach to communities in need. Key partners in FY22 included AVANCE, Todos Juntos, Con Mi Madre, Austin Area Urban League (AAUL), Community Coalition for Health (C2H), Dell Valle Community Coalition, Hays Latinos United, Vivent Health, Saffron Trust Pflugerville, St. James Episcopal Church, and San Francisco de Asis Episcopal Church. Critical to community engagement and increased access to essential needs are El Buen's formal collaborations with the City of Austin and Central Texas Food Bank.

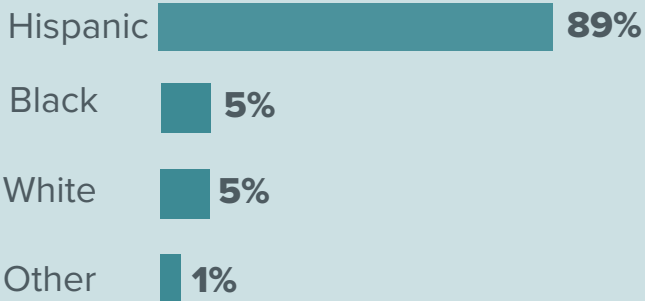

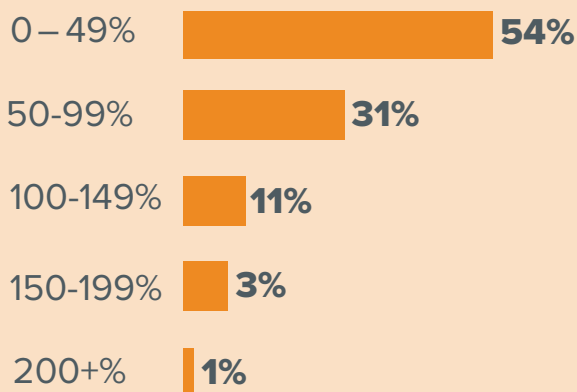

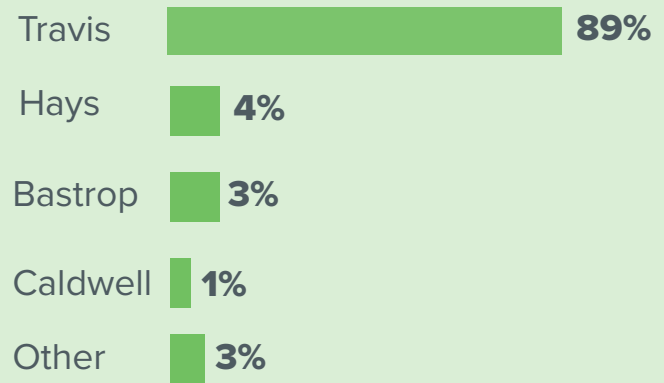


El Buen's average client is a Hispanic woman. She lives in a household of 4 people and has a monthly income of approximately \$1,150 (less than 50% FPL).

# Food Access

Equitable access to food is at the center of El Buen's mission, vision, and services. El Buen has been on the frontline, expanding linkage to and consumption of healthy foods for those in need for 35 years, and actively raising awareness about hunger in Central Texas.



More than 1 in 4 children in Central Texas are food insecure. In 2022, over 14.4% of the Travis County population experienced food insecurity. Living in a food insecure household accelerates negative health consequences. By providing access to healthy and diverse foods, El Buen addresses one of the primary social determinants of health and contributes to the health and wellbeing of thousands of individuals.

El Buen is one of the top 10 largest food pantries in Central Texas, providing access to food for priority populations to include: 1) emergency food access, 2) no cost food/groceries for priority populations, 3) mobile food hubs, 4) direct food delivery SNAP application assistance, and 5) supportive services via closed-loop referrals using our Coordinated Care Network (CCN). These services are part of a comprehensive approach to build the food access infrastructure.

# Hands for Hope

## Hands for Hope

El Buen's annual Hands for Hope (H4H) campaign supports year-round food access and support services. The H4H campaign also funds El Buens Flagship H4H Events in November and December. This event has been growing over the last years. In 2021, we provided holiday meal kits, prepared family-style holiday meals, and H-E-B food cards to 2,306 families (10,523 individuals) and in 2022, we increased the number of families served to 2,651 (10,563 individuals).

# Coordinated Care Network



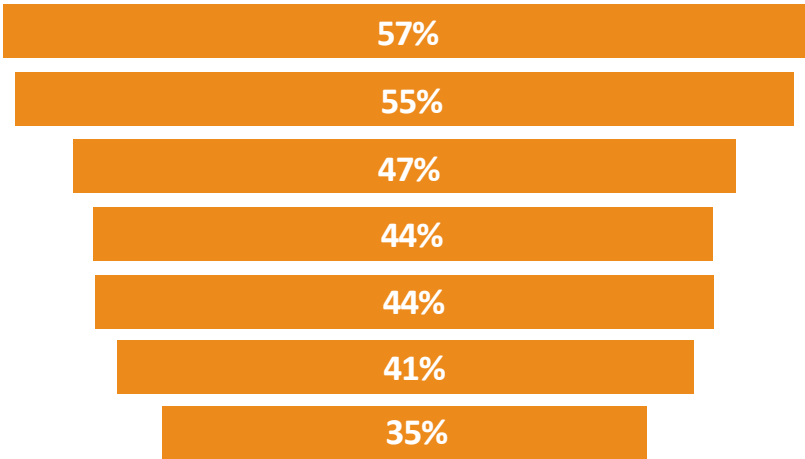
El Buen’s Coordinated Care Network (CCN) focuses on addressing social determinants of health and creating access to health services and resources focusing on maternal and reproductive health, family planning, adolescent health, diabetes management, prevention of chronic illness, and other services. In FY22, El Buen’s CCN 6,827 health encounters through assessments, phone calls, and warm referrals to health and social services.

# Rental Assistance & Tenant Stabilization

In FY22, El Buen strengthened its ability to deliver large scale tenant rental assistance, eviction prevention assistance and tenant relocation services. Guided by evidence-based research, best practices, data intelligence, and community input, El Buen has established extensive and sophisticated data and technology systems and security, partnerships, and experience deploying financial and rental assistance projects. We have made strategic investments to establish a best-in-class infrastructure that leverages drive-through facilities, human resources (90% bilingual staff), technology and data management capacity to maintain unprecedented levels of connection, engagement, and participation with the families and individuals we serve.

# Adult Education

In FY22, El Buen provided virtual adult education and workforce development including English as a Second Language (ESL) and Digital Literacy to adult learners, as well as implementation of the Latinas' Education Advancement and Development (LEAD) Program.

El Buen combines research-based curricula, data analysis, technology, and peer-to-peer learning to provide innovative programming to support adult learners. In FY22 El Buen's ESL classes and digital literacy classes continued virtually, based primarily on participants' needs

for online learning to support their work schedules, parenting, and additional education.

The LEAD Program provides Latina immigrants participating in El Buen's Adult Education services academic and workforce development, pathways to college or technical schools, access to health and social services, academic support for children, and financial literacy.

# CHW Training Center



For more than 12 years, El Buen’s Community Health Worker (CHW) Training Center has played a key role in the development and sustainability of the CHW workforce in Austin/Travis and surrounding counties. CHWs serve as a bridge between health and social services and Latino and immigrant communities, facilitating access to services and improving the cultural competency of service delivery. El Buen’s experience working with the CHW workforce includes training, certification, community partnerships and coordinated care initiatives to address health disparities.

El Buen recognizes that long-term sustainable impact requires drawing upon formal partner

collaborations that gather together collectively experiences, resources, and commitment for the training and development of the CHW workforce. El Buen established collaborations with the following partners for joint CHW training, curricula development, certification, and co-development of online training modules: 1) The University of Texas at Austin School of Nursing, 2) CARDEA; and 3) CONNECT ATX.

In FY22 through facilitation of its annual 160-hr CHW certification course, El Buen trained 200 Community Health Workers. Eighteen CHWs from Austin Voices for Youth and Education were certified as Community Health Worker Instructors (CHWI) in October 2022.

# Youth Services Program

El Buen's Youth Services strategy is to provide every student with the opportunities and experiences to actualize their full potential.

## Youth Services Activities in FY22

- Initiated a Youth Leadership Development
- Facilitated Comprehensive Wrap-Around Services for youth and their families
- Facilitated 10 workshop sessions and orientation for Parent Engagement & Support.
- Distributed 1000 backpacks with school supplies at the Summer 2022 Back to School Event

For the first time since the pandemic, El Buen held an in-person summer camp for youth entering 1st through 8th grades. The STEM and Arts based 2022 Summer Camp curriculum was developed using nationally accredited models and in partnership with other organizations, including The Thinkery, NXP- Hispanic Education Awareness Team (HEAT), and the Austin School of Film.

# Intergenerational Programming

El Buen's *Juntos: Sharing our Stories* program funded through a St. David's Foundation focused on cultivating skills that lead to intergenerational engagement, volunteerism, and workforce development. *Juntos* allowed older adults and middle school youth to participate in an intergenerational educational and active collaboration. Participants attended technology and digital training sessions that allowed them to co-create a Photovoice Art Exhibit comprised of photos they took and edited to memorialize their shared experiences.



## Youth Story

Andres, Alejandra & Javier, *Youth Students*

### What did you like the best about classes at El Buen?

**Andres:** "I liked interacting with the adults and learning about their lives and career paths. We took photos and created photo stories about our experiences together— creating a history through photos ."

**Alejandra:** "I liked the after school academic enrichment. I got a lot of help with my homework after school, working individually with a tutor / mentor. I explored topics I had not learned before, for example, website classes. I learned how to use the internet."

**Javier:** "I liked my afterschool teacher. They were very understanding and taught me to prepare scientific notation. They also helped me prepare for exams in school. El Buen taught me to have more confidence in English and Spanish."





# Vaccine Access



El Buen continued to address the inequitable access to COVID-19 vaccines and education in Central Texas. Through partnerships and a strategic and coordinated effort to reach diverse communities, El Buen improved vaccination rates in FY 2022. Specifically, in January of 2022, more than 75% of the Eastern Crescent's residents had received at least one vaccine dose compared to only 44% in May 2021. Based on El Buen's FY22 client surveys, only 18% of respondents (who were Latino and residents of the Eastern Crescent) indicated that they remain unvaccinated and hesitant to become vaccinated in the future. El Buen's focus is to continued to refine its approach to reach unvaccinated residents and is currently implementing a biweekly routine vaccine program for adults.

# Social Justice Framework



*El Buen was founded to address the challenges that create the marginalization of Latino immigrants—challenges created by lack of equity, inclusion, and access. For more than 35 years, we have been co-creators with community—collaboratively leading a path to ensure opportunities for all to experience belonging, access, and wellbeing.*

## Culture Statement

Equity is at the core of our organizational culture statement. El Buen commits to “work from a strength-based and trauma-informed perspective, leading and moving forward social justice and anti-racist actions to create systems that promote equity, community inclusion, opportunities, and advancement.”

El Buen brings more than 70 years of staff experience addressing racial equity and inclusion—collaborating with low-income individuals and historically marginalized populations.

Ninety-five percent of staff are bilingual, 77% are Latino, and 80% come from historically marginalized populations. El Buen’s Board of Directors are 46% Latino.

# Volunteer Impact

## ***What prompted you to volunteer?***

"I started volunteering at El Buen twelve years ago. I had friends who were volunteers, and they recommended it to me. Through volunteering initially at Hands for Hope I met Juan, and I met Father Bertie. I was so inspired by Father Bertie that I wanted to work in the food pantry. Over my twelve years volunteering at El Buen, I have also worked as a substitute ESL instructor—and in person prior to the COVID-19 pandemic."

## ***What keeps you coming back?***

"I started working at El Buen believing I could help others and offer hope in a world with so little hope. Over time I began to see that my own hope was being strengthened. I started to see that hope was not only a good thing, but hope is the best of things. Our hope dwells in each one of us through the power of God. When I see people shed tears of joy upon receiving food from El Buen, I believe God is not only working through me, but our heavenly Father God is working through all of us. I hope when you read this, God hears your prayers and provides you with a measure of comfort in knowing you have given some of your hope to someone that has none. God Bless and keep you all."

## ***What makes El Buen so special?***

"Juan and Rosa are special because they are like a lighthouse a beacon of light—helping others—and working with them is an inspiration for me."

## ***Do you recommend people to volunteer at El Buen?***

"Yes, I recommend people to volunteer at El Buen all the time."

## ***Anything else you want to share?***

"El Buen is always focused on helping others. When I arrive to volunteer, even if it has been a rough work week for me, I show up, and that feels good. The positive attitude and feelings I receive from volunteering at El Buen I take back with me to my workplace, and I see it resonate with my coworkers. "

## Annual Campaigns

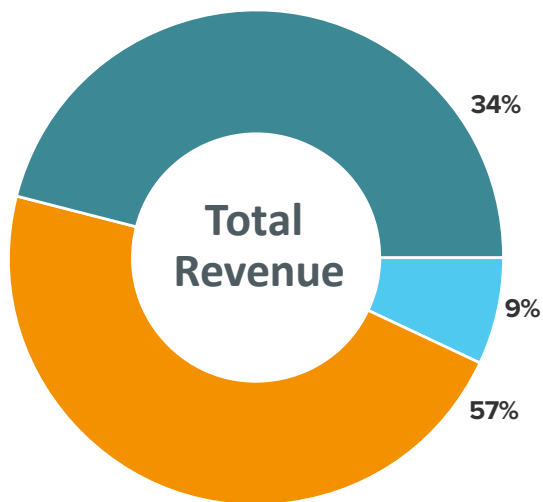

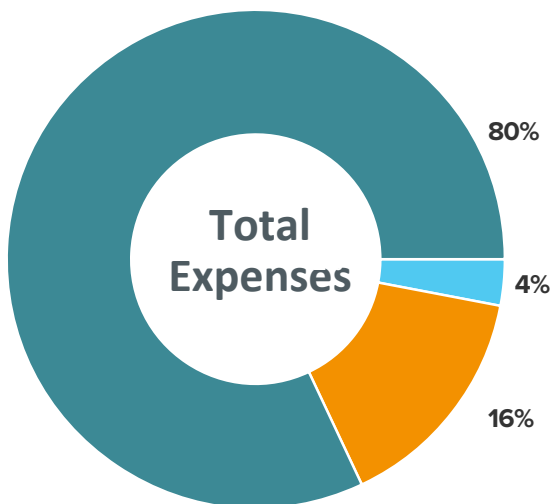

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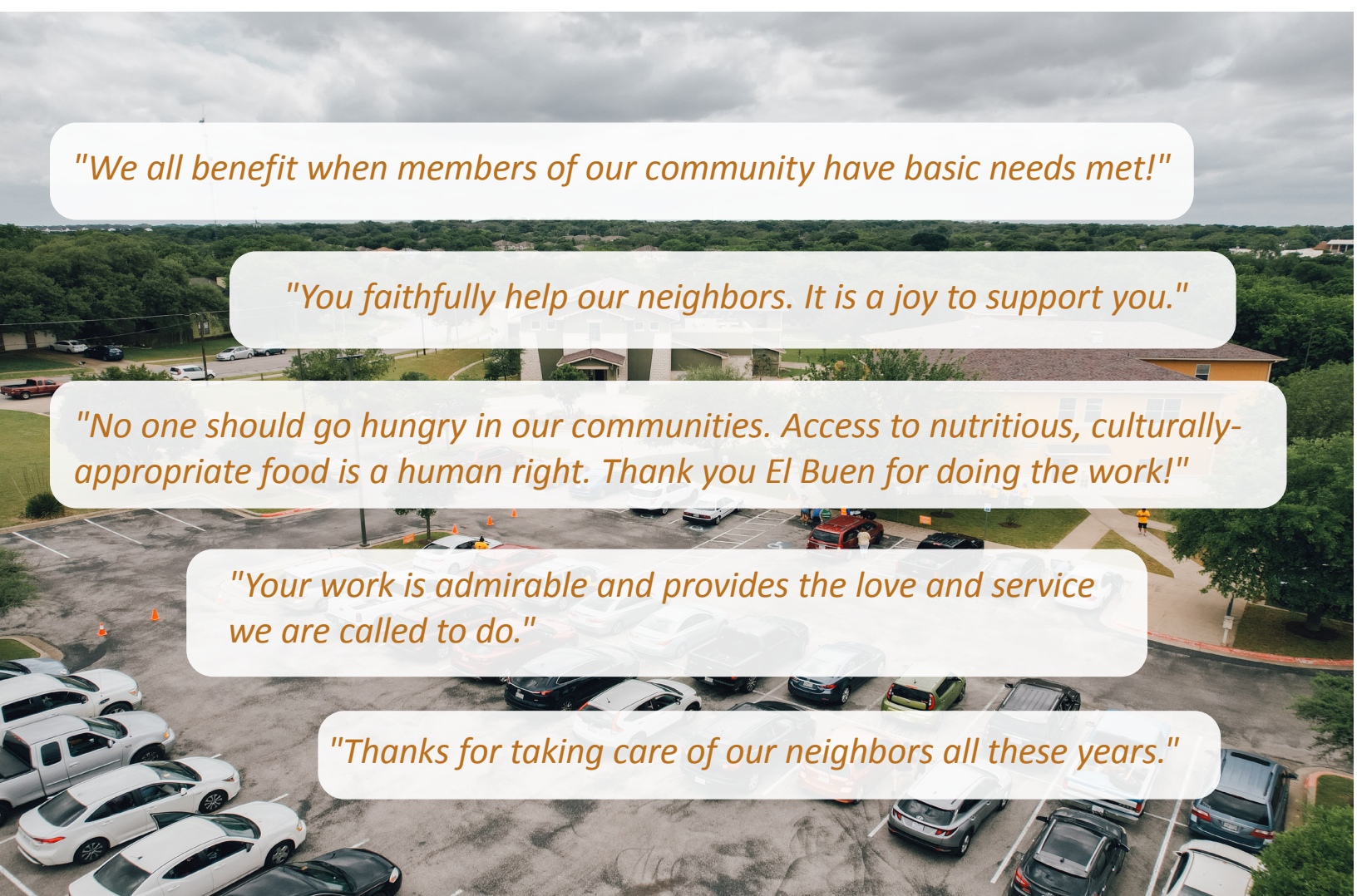
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
